05 Truth Without Hostility

Because Christ calls His people to represent Him faithfully, Christian witness requires speaking truth clearly while rejecting the anger and contempt that often dominate public life.

EXPOSE

Christians are called to speak truth clearly. Faithfulness does not mean silence. It does not mean avoiding difficult issues. And it does not mean hiding biblical convictions.

But Scripture consistently calls believers to combine clarity with humility and conviction with gentleness.

James reminds us that human anger does not produce God's righteousness. Paul urges believers to let their speech be gracious and thoughtful. Peter instructs Christians to defend their hope with gentleness and respect.

When the tone of our speech mirrors the outrage of the world, something important is lost. Truth may still be spoken, but the character of Christ becomes harder to see.

Peacemaking requires more than correct arguments. It requires a posture shaped by humility, patience, and love. Christians are not called to win every argument. We are called to bear faithful witness to the truth.

ENGAGE
